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
### Early Intervention Technical Assistance (EITA)

Early Intervention Technical Assistance (EITA) provides training and technical assistance to local Infant/Toddler and Preschool Early Intervention programs providing support and services to children birth to school age with developmental disabilities and their families. EITA also supports local agencies that provide Evidence-Based Home Visiting (EBHV) services and family support programs serving children birth to school age and their caregivers. EITA works on behalf of the Bureau of Early Intervention Services and Family Supports (BEISFS) under the Office of Child Development and Early Learning (OCDEL), and the Departments of Human Services and Education. EITA is part of the Pennsylvania Training and Technical Assistance Network (PaTTAN). EITA is administered through the Tuscarora Intermediate Unit.



### Introduction to the Pyramid Model

This module introduces the Pyramid Model framework to participants and should be used before the other modules. Topics include: the relationship of the Pyramid Model to prevention science, equity, inclusion, trauma-informed care, anti-bias practice and the use of data for decision-making, understanding child behavior, and the research that provides an evidence-base for the use of the Pyramid Model.

Preschool Module 1: Nurturing and Responsive Relationships Establishing nurturing and responsive relationships within a caring community is the foundation of the Pyramid Model. This training focuses on practices for building relationships with children, promoting relationships between children, relationships with families that affirm family culture and identity, and relationships with team members.

Preschool Module 2: High-**Quality, Supportive** Environments

This module focuses on the practices for establishing highquality supportive classroom environments that promote social-emotional skill development and prevent challenging behavior. Practices related to schedules, routines, transitions, promoting engagement, expectations, and rules are addressed in the workshop.

Preschool Module 3: Teaching Social-Emotional Skills

Promoting social-emotional development is core to the Pyramid Model, This module provides training on the practices for teaching friendship skills, emotional literacy, selfregulation, and problem-solving.

### How Basic Needs Determine Behavior

According to William Glasser, human beings have **five basic needs: survival**, **belonging, power, freedom, and fun**. Those five needs affect what we do and how we behave. When we're hungry or tired, we get grumpy or irritable; when we feel trapped, we lash out; when we're lonely we withdraw or try to draw attention to ourselves. If as adults we understand how not having these five basic needs met affects the way we act, as families and caregivers we should be able to consider that unmet needs might be causing a young child's challenging behavior. Chances are the child isn't misbehaving just to annoy us.

### The Five Basic Needs


- Survival: physical needs for food, water, shelter, sleep, and safety/security
- Belonging: relationships and friendships and feeling accepted, cared for, and loved by others
- **Power:** feeling capable, worthy, and having pride in accomplishments
- Freedom: the need for independence and the ability to make choices, create, and explore
- Fun: laughter, pleasure, enjoyment, humor

Understanding these basic needs can help families and caregivers think differently about behavior and not assume that a child is deliberately trying to be difficult. Each child responds differently to an unmet need, so it is important to treat children as individuals and teach them better ways to satisfy their needs.

### **Developing Suspension and Expulsion Policies**

It is *essential* all young children can both access and remain in a quality early learning program. In July 2017, Pennsylvania early learning programs were informed of the requirement to develop program specific policies to prevent, reduce and ultimately eliminate suspension and expulsion of young children from their programs.

Suspension and expulsion are actions adults take that greatly impact children. We can work together to make sure both children and teachers have the support they need to build great relationships and remain a part of their early learning community.

In December 2014, the US Departments of Health and Human Services and Education published **Policy Statement on Expulsion and Suspension in Early Childhood Settings**. In response to this statement, OCDEL has drafted an office wide announcement to provide guidance to programs regarding appropriate behavior support practices and the reduction of expulsion and suspension in early childhood programs in Pennsylvania.




